

## CONSEQUENCES OF SIN: THE SERPENT WILL BEAR THE CONSEQUENCE OF HIS REBELLION

What is God's curse on the serpent? (14-15)

#### Romans 16:20a

The God of peace will soon crush Satan under your feet.

The real battle is between Satan and the offspring of the Woman. The offspring who will bruise ("crush" NIV) the head of the serpent is Christ Himself; Who comes from the Woman (Genesis 3:15). This is the first gospel message. It is termed the protoevangelium.

#### **WOMEN WILL BEAR THE CONSEQUENCE OF EVE'S SIN. (16)**

#### What are God's consequence on women?

- She will bring forth children in pain (16a)—The literal translation is "causing to be great, I shall cause to be great your sorrow"—an intense statement, repeated for emphasis.
- She will desire to have control over her husband.
- A parallel passage to Genesis 3:16b is found fifteen verses later in Genesis 4:7. Genesis 3:16b—"Your desire shall be contrary to your husband, and he shall rule over you." Genesis 4:7—"Sin is crouching at your door. Its desire is contrary to you, but you must rule over it." The same word for desire is used in both passages (tešûqâ), nom. desire, request, longing, appetite (H9592). "As in Genesis 4:7, there is a struggle in Genesis 3:16 between the one who has the desire (wife) and the one who must/should rule or master (husband). Cain did not win his battle with sin, and the victory of the husband is not necessarily assured by God in Genesis 3:16b. The 'curse' here describes the beginning of the battle of the sexes. After the fall, the husband no longer rules easily; he must fight for his headship. The woman's desire is to control her husband (to usurp divinely appointed headship), and he must master her, if he can. Sin has corrupted both the willing submission of the wife and the loving headship of the husband. And so, the rule of love founded in paradise is replaced by struggle, tyranny, domination, and manipulation." There will be a fracturing from the equality and complementarity that man and woman enjoyed, to a mutual desire to dominate. "I am placing my desires and my will before yours."

### MEN WILL BEAR THE CONSEQUENCES OF ADAM'S SIN. (17-24)

### What are God's consequence on men?

- Work will be hard during this life. Man's primary role is to work the ground and bring forth abundance. Before the fall, the ground produced only what was good, and man received joy from his work. After the fall, man will labor in painful toil just to subsist
- Man's final end—death. The result of Adam's sin extended to the entire human race.
- Man will experience relational conflict.
- Man experienced the loss of the close presence of God.

Although all mankind suffers the ramifications of Adam and Eve's Original Sin, Iod is a redemptive Iod. He redeems the original consequences, ultimately in eternity but partially on earth.

The following Scriptures show examples of god's redemptive acts regarding children, marriage, and labor.

### Psalm 127:3

Behold, children are a heritage from the Lord, the fruit of the womb a reward.

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# The Robe of Righteousness

We are all born naked, physically and spiritually, because of Adam and Eve's sin and resulting curse. Though physically you learn to clothe yourself, you can never clothe yourself spiritually. Only God through Christ can spiritually clothe you.

When Adam and Eve sinned, their eyes were opened and they realized they stood bare before God. They were ashamed and tried to sew together fig leaves to hide their nakedness. But God responded by clothing them with garments of skin from an animal he had slain (Genesis 3:21). God in His kindness restored their dignity. Fig leaves are fragile and temporary. Animal skin is more durable, longer lasting.

Like Adam and Eve, all your sin is laid bare before God ("Nothing is covered up that will not be revealed, or hidden that will not be known. Therefore whatever you have said in the dark shall be heard in the light, and what you have whispered in private rooms shall be proclaimed on the housetops." Luke 12:2–3); and none of your "righteous deeds" is sufficient to cover your spiritual nakedness. You cannot restore relationship with God yourself. Though you may try to spiritually clothe yourself by good works, "[w]e have all become like one who is unclean, and all our righteous deeds are like a polluted garment" (Isaiah 64:6a).

Only God can provide a garment that will cover your shame. But instead of the skin of an animal as He did for Adam and Eve, He now clothes you with the ultimate garment—a garment of righteousness that was purchased with the blood of his Son, Jesus Christ. ("Without the shedding of blood there is no forgiveness of sins." Hebrews 9:22; "For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God." 2 Corinthians 5:21)

The blood of Jesus covers your sins, and you are forgiven and made righteous. "Blessed are those whose lawless deeds are forgiven, and whose sins are covered" (Romans 4:7).

"I will greatly rejoice in the Lord; my soul shall exult in my God, for he has clothed me with the garments of salvation; he has covered me with the robe of righteousness, as a bridegroom decks himself like a priest with a beautiful headdress, and as a bride adorns herself with her jewels" (Isaiah 61:10).

The parable of the prodigal son is a beautiful picture of how God longs to clothe you in His righteousness. When the father sees his prodigal son from a distance, he runs to him receiving him home. The father instructs his servants to adorn his repentant son with his best robe. ("But the father said to his servants, 'Bring quickly the best robe, and put it on him...." Luke 15:22)

Jesus told another parable of a wedding feast. When the master finds a man at the wedding banquet without his wedding garment, he throws him out (Matthew 22:1–14). In the same way, you cannot enter the Kingdom of God without the Robe of Righteousness bought by Christ's blood.

Revelation also includes the imagery of a white robe. Unit 6 tells of the martyred saints each being given a white robe to wear until the end. ("Then they were each given a white robe and told to rest a little longer, until the number of their fellow servants and

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## Conviction Versus Condemnation

Conviction is grief or sorrow over specific sins that should bring you to repent of your sins and to embrace forgiveness. It is godly sorrow described in 2 Corinthians 7:9–10. Because of His love for you, the Holy Spirit convicts you to save you from your sin and its harmful effects (John 16:8; Psalm 32:3–5). It is God's gracious gift to you that you feel His displeasure so that you can repent and experience God's forgiveness that you received at salvation (sanctification: 1 John 1:9; Colossians 1:13–14). Jesus' death and resurrection secured your standing before God once for all (justification: Hebrews 10:10). He has presented you to the Father as holy, blameless, and above reproach (Colossians 1:22). Because sin grieves God, mars your fellowship with Him, and destroys the quality of life God intends for you to enjoy, in His kindness He is faithful and persistent to convict you of your specific sin and lead you to repentance.

Christ died and became your condemnation. "There is therefore now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus" (Romans 8:1; condemnation—katakrima—the punishment following a guilty sentence). Yet at times you may experience condemning feelings or thoughts, which may come from judgment (perceived or real) from your own heart (1 John 3:19–20), from others, or from your accuser, the devil (Revelation 12:10). Condemnation is general and sweeping in nature and often leads to guilt or shame followed by feelings of discouragement, defeat, and even despair ("I will never change"). Condemning feelings must be countered with biblical truth (See Micah 7:7–9.

# "A Picture of the Perfect Father" —A Personal Testimony

Growing up I always worked with my Dad in our yard or on our family farm. The work was a lot of physical labor: tractors, quads, etc. I learned a lot from my Dad as I worked beside him. The expectations he set for me as we worked together were those of an adult, and he always expected me to perform as such, even though I was a child. I had very little room for error and every weekend I would get yelled at, often more than once, for making one. Even though I was yelled at, I still enjoyed working with my Dad because of the things I got to experience and learn.

Although it was difficult growing up with the "perfection" of an adult expected of a child, I have come to appreciate it in adulthood. It prepared me to handle almost any work situation with a client or boss, and very few things rattle me. It has taught me to work hard, do it right the first time, and grind it out when the situation would typically make it tough to have that mindset.

Even though they were unrealistic expectations, I watched my Dad set a great example for me. He worked hard every day whether it was at home or his job. He was the most consistent person I have ever known; he was amazingly disciplined with daily Bible studies and spending time reading the Word, he showed me how to take care of my family through his example, and I watched God work on and soften him as he got older.

Over the years I have realized how my Dad's extreme expectations actually displayed God's love and discipline for us. When God calls us to unexpected and difficult situations, they often seem unrealistic or overwhelming, and even though we cannot see the future, we can trust God's promise to work everything for our good. He equips us to handle problems and issues that may arise in our lives, that without the difficult circumstances, we may not have been able to. There are growing pains during the process of trusting God in the midst of hardship, but those circumstances create confidence to handle situations in the future.

# How Treat the Father's Love For Us

The Father's great love for us is powerfully displayed in the sacrifice of His Son. As we look through the lens of the story of Abraham and Isaac, the Father and Son's sacrifice becomes all the more precious and meaningful.

In obedience to God and because he loved God supremely and believed that God would raise Isaac from the dead, Abraham was willing to sacrifice on the altar his most precious possession on earth, his son. But his faith and knowledge did not make it easy for Abraham to obey God. What he was about to do to Isaac with his own hands must have been excruciating for him during their three days' journey to Mount Moriah.

But what God the Father had planned to do to His only Son for our sake "before the foundation of the world" (see Ephesians 1:4-10) must also have been excruciating for the Father.

"Abraham had three days in which to think upon, and consider the death of his son; three days in which to look into that beloved face, and to anticipate the hour in which it would wear the icy pallor of death. But the Eternal Father foreknew and foreordained the sacrifice of His only-begotten Son, not three days, nor three years, nor 3,000 years, but before the earth was, Jesus was to His Father, 'the Lamb slain from the foundation of the world.' Long before His birth at Bethlehem it was foretold..."

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# LESSON 2: MY PRODIGAL GOD

In Lesson 2 you will see what kind of extravagant love your Father has for you. A poignant example of the Father's love is found in the Parable of the Prodigal Son.

God your Father is a prodigal God because He lavishes His love on you (Ephesians 1:7-8), His prodigal child. All of us are prodigals by nature. Left to ourselves, we would expend all our efforts and love on things that do not ultimately satisfy.

## The Parable of the Prodigal Son

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## LESSON 3: UNDERSTANDING GOD'S SOVEREIGNTY

In Lesson 1 and 2 you learned how God, your perfect Father, is committed to you as His precious child.

In Lesson 3 you will explore what it means that your Father is in control over every detail of your life. He holds you in His hands, so you can trust Him with your whole heart.

#### "SOVEREIGNTY" DEFINED

God's sovereignty means that He is in absolute control over every detail in your life as well as every detail of human history—He is sovereign over microscopic details and macroscopic details—for His glory and for your good. Nothing happens apart from His purpose and His will. Sovereignty means that God not only knows what will happen but that He plans what will happen.

Because God controls all things, He can and does work all things together for a believer's good (Romans 8:28). "All things"—both good and bad. Solomon in Ecclesiastes states, "He has made everything beautiful in its time. Also, he has put eternity into man's heart, yet so that he cannot find out what God has done from the beginning to the end" (Ecclesiastes 3:11). God always works things out according to His purposes. But the working out of His purposes may not be on your timeline or in your lifetime. You will not see what God has done from the beginning to the end.



# LESSON 4: UNDERSTANDING GOD'S HOLINESS (AND HIS JUSTICE, WRATH, AND MERCY)

In Lessons 1 and 2 you learned about God's love as demonstrated in God as our loving Father. In Lesson 3 you learned that God is sovereign over every detail of your life.

In Lesson 4 you will explore God's holiness and how His holiness is displayed in His justice, wrath, and mercy. It is from the perspective of God's holiness that you are able to grasp His justice, wrath, and mercy more fully.



#### **HOLINESS OF GOD**

What does it mean god is holy? The Hebrew word for "holy" is qadowsh and means "apartness, set apartness, separateness, sacredness."

Read the following Scriptures and describe an aspect of God's holiness.

#### Isaiah 57:15a

For thus says the One who is high and lifted up, who inhabits eternity, whose name is Holy.

#### 1 John 1:5

This is the message we have heard from him and proclaim to you, that God is light, and in him is no darkness at all.

#### **Exodus 15:11**

"Who is like you, O Lord, among the gods? Who is like you, majestic in holiness, awesome in glorious deeds, doing wonders?"

#### Revelation 15:4

"Who will not fear, O Lord, and glorify your name? For you alone are holy. All nations will come and worship you, for your righteous acts have been revealed."



#### GOD'S HOLINESS REQUIRES JUSTICE—WRATH AGAINST SIN

"God is holy and therefore He cannot overlook sin. If He did He would be denying part of who He is. The anger or wrath of God flows from His holiness. 'It is not a capricious, arbitrary, bad-tempered and conceited anger which pagans attribute to their gods. It is not the sinful, resentful, malicious, infantile anger which we find among humans. It is a function of that holiness which is expressed in the demands of God's moral law.' God's holy character cannot be compromised, so His response to sin is both necessary and right."

J. I. Packer

"God's anger and wrath must always be seen in relation to his maintaining and defending his attributes of love and holiness, as well as his righteousness and justice. The emotion or passion that moves God to this maintaining and defending is expressed by the terms 'displeasure,' 'indignation,' 'anger,' and 'wrath.' A consequence of his wrath is vengeance, punishment, and death."

God's perfection and holiness requires that He not overlook or ignore sin. Since all of humanity is sinful (Psalm 14:3; Romans 3:23), God is just and right to respond wrathfully toward mankind. God is perfect in all His ways, including His wrath. (Deuteronomy 32:4—"The Rock, his work is perfect, for all his ways are justice. A God of faithfulness and without iniquity, just and upright is he.")

## GOD'S HOLY WRATH IS REVEALED THROUGHOUT THE OLD AND NEW TESTAMENT

#### Jeremiah 30:23

Behold the storm of the Lord! Wrath has gone forth, a whirling tempest; it will burst upon the head of the wicked.

#### Nahum 1:2

The Lord is a jealous and avenging God; the Lord is avenging and wrathful; the Lord takes vengeance on his adversaries and keeps wrath for his enemies.

## HOW DO SINFUL PEOPLE STAND UNDER GOD'S WRATH? THEY STAND BECAUSE OF HIS MERCY!

Although God is right and good to respond wrathfully to sin, He chooses to respond in mercy. What is the mercy of God? According to Noah Webster's 1828 Dictionary, "mercy" is "that benevolence, mildness or tenderness of heart which disposes a person to overlook injuries, or to treat an offender better than he deserves; the disposition that tempers justice...to forbear punishment...or inflict less than law or justice will warrant." God does not punish you as your sins deserve. The Hebrew word for mercy is hesed, and it means "steadfast loyalty; God's covenant lovingkindness."

Romans 3:25b says that "in [God's] divine forbearance he had passed over former sins" until Christ came in "the fullness of time" (Galatians 4:4). In other words, before Christ's sacrifice on the cross, God patiently displayed His mercy by not immediately punishing sin. When Jesus came and died on the cross to take the punishment that you deserved for your sins, He took God's wrath upon Himself.

"What is mercy? Mercy is God acting patient[ly]. It is God extending patience to those who deserve to be punished. Mercy is not something God owes to us—by definition mercy cannot be owed—but is something God extends in kindness and grace to those who do not deserve it. God does not owe you or anyone else his mercy."<sup>4</sup>

God's wrath is powerful and dreadful (Hebrews 10:31), but God is also merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness (Exodus 34:6).

### **GOD'S MERCY IS REVEALED THROUGHOUT THE NEW TESTAMENT** 1 Peter 1:3 Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! According to his great mercy, he has caused us to be born again to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. . 1 Peter 2:10 Once you were not a people, but now you are God's people; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy. God's mercy provided a way for you to avoid His wrath. Because Jesus took God's wrath upon Himself (Isaiah 53:4-5; 1 John 2:2), you are now a recipient of His mercy, never to experience His wrath. You cannot stand before God on your own merit, but as a follower of Christ, you stand in the presence of your Holy Father because of the righteous covering of Christ (2 Corinthians 5:21, Colossians 3:3). Those who never come to a saving faith in Jesus, however, will one day experience God's wrath because their sins have not been paid for by Christ's death (Matthew 25:46; Colossians 3:6; Revelation 19:15). God's holiness demands payment for sins. Read the following verses. Romans 5:9 Since, therefore, we have now been justified by his blood, much more shall we be saved by him from the wrath of God. 1 Thessalonians 5:9-10 For God has not destined us for wrath, but to obtain salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ, who died for us so that whether we are awake or asleep we might live with him. This is the wonderful truth of God's mercy in relation to His holiness, justice, and wrath: God sent His Son to be "just and the justifier of the one who has faith in Jesus" (Romans 3:26). He both demanded the payment for sin and provided the offering. Think about the truth that you no longer have the wrath of God upon you. Holy, merciful Father God invites you into His presence through the sacrifice of your Savior, Jesus Christ. Describe your thoughts and feelings below.

| To understand why David was a man after God's own heart, we need to see what characteristics he had to qualify for such an exalted description. In the book of Acts, the apostle Paul speaks of God's feelings about King David: "After removing Saul, he made David their king. He testified concerning him: "I have found David son of Jesse a man after My own heart; he will do everything I want him to do." (Acts 13:22). The answer to why David was considered a man after God's own heart is found right in the verse: David did whatever God wanted him to do. An obvious question is how God still called David a man after His own heart when David committed such terrible sins, including adultery nd murder?  |
| We learn much of David's character in the book of Psalms as he opened up his life for all to examine. David's life was a portrait of success and failure, and the biblical record highlights the fact that David was far from perfect. But what made David a cut above the rest was that his heart was pointed toward God. He had a deep desire to follow God's will and do "everything" God wanted him to do. He was a man after God's own heart. Let's look at some characteristics of David's life to discover what that entails.   |
| Part of why David is called a man after God's own heart is that he had absolute faith in God. Nowhere in Scripture is this point better illustrated than in 1 Samuel 17 where David as a young shepherd boy fearlessly slew the Philistine, Goliath. Shortly before the duel, we see direct evidence of David's faith when David says, "'The LORD who delivered me from the paw of the bear will deliver me from the hand of this Philistine.' And Saul said to David, 'Go, and the LORD be with you!'" (verse 37). David was fully aware that God was in control of his life, and he had faith that God would deliver him from impending danger. How else would one venture into a potentially fatal situation with such calm and confidence? David knew early on in life that God was to be trusted and obeyed. As we see in Scripture, David's faith pleased God, and God rewards David for his faithfulness. |
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#### My Heart Unchained

Another reason David was a man after God's own heart is that he absolutely loved God's Law. Of the 150 psalms in the Bible, David is credited for writing over half of them. Writing at various and often troubling times in his life, David repeatedly mentioned how much he loved God's perfect Word. We find a beautiful example of this in Psalm 119:47–48: "For I delight in your commands because I love them. I lift up my hands to your commands, which I love, and I meditate on your decrees." It is not hard to see his complete adoration for God's Word. Also notice how David "meditates" on God's statutes. God granted David understanding and wisdom through daily meditation. We would do well to not only read God's Word but also think about it throughout the day, for God loves us to think about Him. "Blessed are they who keep his statutes and seek Him with all their heart. They do nothing wrong; they walk in His ways" (Psalm 119:2–3).

David was a man after God's own heart in that he was truly thankful. "I wash my hands in innocence, and go about your alter, O LORD, proclaiming aloud your praise and telling of all your wonderful deeds." (Psalm 26:6–7). David's life was marked by seasons of great peace and prosperity as well as times of fear and despair. But through all of the seasons in his life, he never forgot to thank the Lord for everything that he had. It is truly one of David's finest characteristics. "Enter His gates with thanksgiving, and His courts with praise! Give thanks to Him, bless His name!" (Psalm 100:4 ESV). As followers of Jesus Christ, we would do well to follow David's lead of offering praise through thanksgiving to our Lord.

After he sinned, David was truly repentant. David's sin with Bathsheba is recorded in 2 Samuel 11:2–5. The mighty fall hard, and David's fall included adultery, lying, and murder. He had sinned against God, and he admits in in 2 Samuel 12:13: "David said to Nathan, 'I have sinned against the LORD.' And Nathan said to David, 'The LORD also has put away your sin; you shall not die.'" But admitting our sin and asking for forgiveness is only half of the equation. The other half is his repentance, and David did that as well. Psalm 51 is David's prayer of repentance to God: "Have mercy on me, O God, according to your steadfast love; according to your abundant mercy blot out my transgressions. Wash me thoroughly from my iniquity, and cleanse me from my sin!" (Psalm 51:1–2).

In conclusion, David was a man after God's own heart because he demonstrated his faith and was committed to following the Lord. Yes, his faith was tested on a grand scale, and he failed at times. But after his sin he sought and received the Lords forgiveness. In the final analysis, David loved God's Law and sought to follow it exactly. As a man after God's own heart, David is a role model for all of us.

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## Joshua—Israel's Leader Whose Confidence Was in the Power of Jod

Joshua was one of the outstanding characters of the Old Testament. He was an assistant to Moses (Exodus 24:13; 32:17–33:11). He was one of the twelve tribal leaders sent to spy out the land God had promised in preparation for entering it. He was one of the two spies who reported that the land could be conquered and possessed. He was a successful general (Exodus 17). Joshua was courageous and godly and served as God's leader for bringing the people of Israel into the land God had promised.

God's power assures His promise of land would be kept. Israel conquered the land by God's promise and power. God gave the right to possess it and the power to take it.

What gave Joshua such confidence in the power of God?

- Joshua witnessed the parting of the Red Sea and the safe passage of the people through it.
- Shortly after this Israel encountered its first enemy, Amalek. Joshua led the Lord's army in that battle (Exodus 17:8–16).
- When Moses and the elders of Israel ascended Mount Sinai to see God and to eat in His presence, Joshua was with them, and Joshua went still further up the mount with Moses (Exodus 24:9–13).
- Joshua was alone with Moses on the mountain when the camp below fell into idolatry and debauchers (Exodus 32:17–35).
- Joshua witnessed the Lord's judgment and power against the people for their sin.
- Only Joshua was in the tent of meeting when the Lord spoke to Moses (Exodus 33:7–11).

Joshua's life experience convinced him of the power of the living God. He saw idols had no such power and only the God of Israel was worthy of worship. Joshua was mentored by Moses and God passed His Spirit to Joshua upon Moses' death. Joshua was ordained and called by God to lad the people of Israel into the land God had promised.

After Moses died God told Joshua:

#### Joshua 1:2-7

<sup>2</sup>"Moses my servant is dead. Now therefore arise, go over this Jordan, you and all this people, into the land that I am giving to them, to the people of Israel. <sup>3</sup>Every place that the sole of your foot will tread upon I have given to you, just as I promised to Moses. <sup>4</sup>From the wilderness and this Lebanon as far as the great river, the river Euphrates, all the land of the Hittites to the Great Sea toward the going down of the sun shall be your territory. <sup>5</sup>No man shall be able to stand before you all the days of your life. Just as I was with Moses, so I will be with you. I will not leave you or forsake you. <sup>6</sup>Be strong and courageous, for you shall cause this people to inherit the land that I swore to their fathers to give them. <sup>7</sup>Only be strong and very courageous, being careful to do according to all the law that Moses my

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servant commanded you. Do not turn from it to the right hand or to the left, that you may have good success wherever you go.

Joshua's confidence was founded on the power of God who promised victory. Joshua boldly stepped out upon God's command.

"God's power is a mighty power, for it brought us from death to life and called us out of darkness into the marvelous light. It is an invincible power, for it subdued our inveterate enmity to God, overcame our stubborn obstinacy, and made us willing to receive Christ as our Lord and King. It is a holy power, for it caused us to repudiate all our righteousness as filthy rags and made us nothing in our own sight. It is a gracious power, for it wrought within us not only when we had no merits of our own but when we had no desire to be subjects of God. It is a glorious power, for by it all our godly affections are sustained and all our acceptable works wrought. It is an infinite power whereby he is able even to subdue all things unto himself (Phil 3:21). God has given us exceeding great and precious promises (2 Peter 1:4). Then there is the exceeding greatness of his power to make them good."3

### **JESUS. HUMBLE SERVANT**

In Philippians 2, Paul beautifully describes how Christ's humanity was characterized by humility and servanthood.

¹So if there is any encouragement in Christ, any comfort from love, any participation in the Spirit, any affection and sympathy, ²complete my joy by being of the same mind, having the same love, being in full accord and of one mind. ³Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility count others more significant than yourselves. ⁴Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others. ⁵Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus, ⁶who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, ¬but emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. ⁶And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross. ⁶Therefore God has highly exalted him and bestowed on him the name that is above every name, ¹oso that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, ¹¹and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

In verse 1, Paul states that as a follower of Christ, you are immersed in Him. His presence encourages you; His love comforts you; His Spirit fills you; His affection and sympathy minister to you. In verse 2, Paul states that you are to be of the same mind as Christ (not only thinking but also attaching your emotions).

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# LESSON 2: JESUS, MY HIGH PRIEST

In Lesson 1 you surveyed Jesus' mission to seek and save the lost by serving those He came to save. Not only is Jesus a humble servant, but He is also High Priest. In service to God, Jesus became both your Priest and your sacrifice.

In Lesson 2 you will discover more about the role and significance of Jesus as the High Priest.

### THE HIGH PRIEST'S ROLE IN THE OLD TESTAMENT

The office of high priest was hereditary through the Levite tribe. The high priest was the supreme religious leader of the Israelites and his most important duty was to conduct the service on the Day of Atonement. Only he was allowed to enter the Most Holy Place behind the veil to stand before God and offer a sacrifice for himself and for the people, for their sins committed during the past year.

The high priest's role on the Day of Atonement is compared to the ministry of Jesus as High Priest.

### Hebrews 9:11-28

<sup>11</sup>But when Christ appeared as a high priest of the good things that have come, then through the greater and more perfect tent (not made with hands, that is, not of this creation) <sup>12</sup>he entered once for all into the holy places, not by means of the blood of goats and calves but by means of his own blood, thus securing an eternal redemption. <sup>13</sup>For if the blood of goats and bulls, and the sprinkling of defiled persons with the ashes of a heifer, sanctify for the purification of the flesh, <sup>14</sup>how much more will the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered himself without blemish to God, purify our conscience from dead works to serve the living God.

<sup>15</sup>Therefore he is the mediator of a new covenant, so that those who are called may receive the promised eternal inheritance, since a death has occurred that redeems them from the transgressions committed under the first covenant. <sup>16</sup>For where a will is involved, the death of the one who made it must be established. <sup>17</sup>For a will takes effect only at death, since it is not in force as long as the one who made it is alive. <sup>18</sup>Therefore not even the first covenant was inaugurated without blood. <sup>19</sup>For when every commandment of the law had been declared by Moses to all the people, he took the blood of calves and goats, with water and scarlet wool and hyssop, and sprinkled both the book itself and all the people, <sup>20</sup>saying, "This is the blood of the covenant that God commanded for you." <sup>21</sup>And in the same way he sprinkled with the blood both the tent and all the vessels used in worship. <sup>22</sup>Indeed, under the law almost everything is purified with blood, and without the shedding of blood there is no forgiveness of sins.

<sup>23</sup>Thus it was necessary for the copies of the heavenly things to be purified with these rites, but the heavenly things themselves with better sacrifices than these. <sup>24</sup>For Christ has entered, not into holy places made with hands, which are copies of the true things, but into heaven itself, now to appear in the presence of God on our behalf. <sup>25</sup>Nor was it to offer himself repeatedly, as the high priest enters the holy places every year with blood not his own, <sup>26</sup>for then he would have had to suffer repeatedly since the foundation of the world. But as it is, he has appeared once for all at the end of the ages to put away sin by the sacrifice of himself. <sup>27</sup>And just as it is appointed for man to die once, and after that comes judgment, <sup>28</sup>so Christ, having been offered once to bear the sins of many, will appear a second time, not to deal with sin but to save those who are eagerly waiting for him.

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# High Priest

In Old Testament times, before Christ's great and final sacrifice for us on the cross, priests were appointed by God to offer daily, weekly, and annual blood sacrifices to atone for (or "cover over") the sins of the people. Because sin is so atrocious, an animal had to sacrifice its life as a substitute for the sinner, for "without the shedding of blood there is no forgiveness" (Hebrews 9:22).

"Tens of thousands of animals were ceremonially slaughtered by Jewish priests for centuries, the spilling of their blood vividly illustrat[ing] the deadly seriousness of sin"—Answers in Genesis (www.answersingenesis.org).

These sacrifices were made in the Tabernacle (while the Israelites were wandering in the desert) and in the Temple (during Solomon's time and Jesus' time). The Tabernacle/ Temple was divided into various areas, including the Holy Place and the Most Holy Place, which was behind the second curtain/veil (Hebrews 9). The daily and weekly sacrifices were made in the Holy Place, and no one was allowed to go into the Most Holy Place except the High Priest on the Day of Atonement.

The High Priest was appointed from among the Levitical line, and one of his most important jobs was to perform the rites on the annual Day of Atonement. On this day, the High Priest, wearing only a simple robe of white linen instead of his usual priestly garment, would reverently and solemnly enter into the Most Holy Place behind the second veil to sprinkle the blood of the animal sacrifice on the Mercy Seat. This was to take away the sins of the people and himself (see Leviticus 16 and Hebrews 9).

Hebrews 9:11–28 tells us that Jesus came as our High Priest. He entered once for all into the Most Holy Place and secured for us an eternal redemption by putting away al of our sins with the sacrifice of His own blood.

When Christ willingly died for us on the cross, it was as if He entered behind the veil as our High Priest and instead of bringing with Him the blood of an animal sacrifice to sprinkle on the Mercy Seat, He climbed upon the Mercy Seat to spill His own blood to make the perfect or complete atonement for our sins. This was the ultimate and final Day of Atonement. He is indeed able to save us to the "uttermost" (Hebrews 7:25).

At the moment of Jesus' death, the veil separating the Most Holy Place from the Holy Place "was torn in two from top to bottom" (Matthew 27:51a). This tearing of the veil and the tearing of Jesus' body on the cross signify the free access we now have to God. ("[W]e have confidence to enter the holy places by the blood of Jesus, by the new and living way that he opened for us through the curtain, that is, through his flesh...." Hebrews 10:19b-20). This is an incredible privilege and we owe it all to our Lord and Savior, our Great High Priest.

| <b>The Holy Spirit is God.</b> When Jesus was baptized, He saw the Spirit of God descending on Him (Matthew 3:16–17).  |
| Jesus declared the Holy Spirit's deity as He commanded that His followers be baptized in the Name of the Trinity: Father, Son, Holy Spirit (Matthew 28:19).  |
| He is called God. When Ananias and Sapphira sinned against the Holy Spirit, they sinned against God (Acts 5:3–4).  |
| <b>The Holy Spirit is omnipotent, omnipresent, and omniscient.</b> The Holy Spirit came upon Mary and the power of the Most High overshadowed her, a virgin, to conceive and give birth to the Son of God (Luke 1:35).             |
| The Spirit is present everywhere; there is no place where you can flee from His presence (Psalm 139:7–8).  |
| The Spirit searches all things, even the deep things of God. Only He can know and reveal the thoughts of God that are beyond your comprehension (1 Corinthians 2:9-11).  |
| <b>The Holy Spirit is eternal.</b> The Lord Jesus promised to send you the Holy Spirit to be your Helper Who will be with you forever (John 14:16).  |
| Through the eternal Spirit, Christ offered Himself unblemished before God so that you may serve the living God (Hebrews 9:14).   |
| <b>The Holy Spirit has emotions.</b> The Holy Spirit was grieved by the rebellion of His people (Isaiah 63:10).  |

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### LESSON 4: WALKING IN THE SPIRIT

In Lesson 3 you learned about the personal attributes and roles of the Holy Spirit. In Lesson 4 you will focus on the Spirit-filled life God desires for you. The Bible teaches that at the point of salvation, the Holy Spirit indwells you and abides in you.

You have been set free to no longer walk in the flesh but rather to walk in the Spirit (Galatians 5:25). You are no longer bound to sin but now you are enslaved to righteousness (Romans 6:18). Obedience to righteousness leads to more righteousness, "sanctification and its end, eternal life" (Romans 6:22). In Lesson 4 you will look at what it means to walk in the Spirit.

### **HOLY SPIRIT, YOUR HELPER**

The promised Holy Spirit is your Helper who guides you into all truth. He reveals to you the beauty of Jesus (John 16:13–14) and transforms you into His likeness (2 Corinthians 3:18). As you depend upon and cooperate with the Holy Spirit, He grows you in the knowledge and love of God, and He enables you to do the following:

- Exalt God with all that you are as you live your life for His purpose and glory (John 15:8)
- Exhibit the fruit of the Spirit (Galatians 5:22–23)
- Experience the Spirit's power (Ephesians 1:19)
- Exercise the gifts that He has given you to build up and promote unity in the church body (1 Corinthians 12:4–7)
- Extend God's kingdom by being a witness for Jesus everywhere you go (Acts 1:8)
- Regenerate and renew (Titus 3:4–5)

#### **WALKING IN THE SPIRIT**

God desires for you to fully enjoy the abundant life He has made available to you in Christ. To experience this you must choose to walk in your new identity—God made you into a new creation; He has regenerated your heart (2 Corinthians 5:17; Titus 3:4-7; Romans 6:11-12). You are no longer enslaved nor are you obligated to sin (Romans 6:6); rather, you are to walk in the Spirit (Galatians 5:25).

In Colossians 3:1-3, Paul writes, "If then you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth. For you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God."

### Read Colossians 3:5-16.

## DO NOT GRIEVE OR QUENCH THE HOLY SPIRIT The Holy Spirit is grieved when a believer lives like an unbeliever and continues to live in the flesh, doing what he knows is wrong. Read Ephesians 4:17-5:5. In what ways does Paul state that we grieve the Holy Spirit? Make a list. "The checks of the Spirit come in the most extraordinarily gentle ways, and if you are not sensitive enough to detect His voice you will quench it, and your personal spiritual life will be impaired. His checks always come as a still small voice, so small that no one but the saint notices them.... Whenever the Spirit checks, call a halt and get the thing right, or you will go on grieving Him without knowing it."2 Oswald Chambers The Holy Spirit checks, warns, and nudges your spirit when you are contemplating sin. You have a choice to either obey or ignore His prompting. When you choose to continually ignore the Holy Spirit's warning, you are quenching His voice (I Thessalonians 5:19). When you choose to sin, the Holy Spirit will not be seen in your attitudes and actions. To act out in a sinful manner, whether in thought or deed, grieves the Holy Spirit. How do you recognize the Holy Spirit's prompting in your life? What does it look or feel like when you are grieving or quenching the Holy Spirit?

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### YIELDING TO THE HOLY SPIRIT

By God's mercy and grace, He has provided the way for you to get back in step with the Spirit. No matter how far you feel you have fallen, the Father eagerly awaits for you to return. Consider the following steps:

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### **LESSON 5: MY TRUE IDENTITY**

In Lessons 1 and 2 you discovered Jesus as your Humble Servant and High Priest. You can confidently approach God, knowing you are forgiven and stand righteous in His presence.

In Lessons 3 and 4 you learned that the Holy Spirit was active in your new birth and is active in your ongoing daily life, transforming you as you walk in step with Him.

In this lesson you will explore what "identity" is and what it means to live out your new identity in Christ through the Holy Spirit.

### WHAT IS "IDENTITY?"

Every human being has an identity. Merriam Webster defines "identity" as "who someone is: the name of a person, the qualities, beliefs, etc. that make a particular person different from others." Many things and people influence your birth identity—your race, gender, talents, physical looks, physical fitness, personality, relationships, socio-economic standing, career, education, life experiences, roles (daughter, wife, mom, etc.).

You live out of your identity. Your goals, motives, and sense of self-worth or lack of worth come from and are directed by your identity. Your identity will define your outlook on life. More importantly, it will determine what you think, feel, and choose.

When someone asks you to describe yourself, what things typically come to mind?

When Adam and Eve sinned, spiritual death came to all mankind (Romans 5:12, 18–19), resulting in all people being born into a state of confusion regarding their identity and their purpose. But thanks be to God, for in Christ, He has redeemed your identity.

#### YOU WERE GIVEN A NEW IDENTITY WHEN YOU WERE BORN SPIRITUALLY

At the point of salvation you were reborn (John 3:3). You were "born of God" (1 John 3:9). You became a new creation. "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come" (2 Corinthians 5:17). Your new identity as a child of God is who you became at the time of your new birth and is who you are now. At the point of your new birth, God's goal for you is to begin to define your worth, motives, goals, values, etc. by your new identity as His child. This is your true identity. Your birth identity becomes secondary to your new identity (Galatians 3:26–29).

"The most important belief that we possess is a true knowledge of who God is. The second most important belief is who we are as children of God, because we cannot consistently behave in a way that is inconsistent with how we perceive ourselves. And if we do not see ourselves as God sees us, then to that degree we suffer from a wrong identity and a poor image of who we really are. It is not what we do that determines who we are. It is who we are that determines what we do."

|                    | You are empowered to walk in the freedom of your new identity by renewing your mind. (Refer to Part 2 Lesson 4.) "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind" (Romans 12:2a). The word "renew" means to "renovate or restore." You are to renovate your mind by recognizing the faulty thinking of your old identity and replacing it with the life-giving truths of God, just as you practiced in the last exercise. The more you bathe your mind with the truths of God's Word and respond to life situations by walking in these truths, the more you will experience your new identity. |
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### Personal Testimony

My parents raised my sister and me in a Christian denomination that was very legalistic. This gave me great head knowledge of the bible, but I didn't really understand and know God. The perfect storm of immigrant parents, a cultural background focused on hard work, and a legalistic religious upbringing created in me a drive to be self-reliant.

I continued to rely on my efforts as I worked my way through school and entered the workforce. According to the world's standards I was a success. I worked in many coveted industries and roles, had an accelerated career path, and had built a nest egg to provide for the family. However, it was never enough. I kept thinking the next promotion or the next salary increase would take care of everything. Then I would get it, be satisfied for a little bit, and then the cycle to chase the next thing would begin. I had relegated God to a secondary position and was really trusting in my way and my hard work. I was essentially violating God's first commandment to have no other gods before Him (Exodus 20:3). The stress of being good enough and striving for the next big thing started to manifest itself physically. I regularly would get chest pains, sores in my mouth, and have restless sleep. In those moments I started to pray and really ask God for his help.

God is true to his promise that if we genuinely seek Him, He will reveal himself to us (Deuteronomy 4:29, Proverbs 8:17). It wasn't a big event but a gradual transformation that God did to move my head knowledge of Him to my heart. He answered my prayers, as I leaned on God and asked for help to grow in knowing and following Him. I began to really understand and embrace that I was a child of God (John 1:12). My identity and self-worth was not in my work title, my bank balance, or what others thought of me. My identity and self-worth is in knowing that the almighty and all-knowing creator loves me and has adopted me as His child.

Last year, I lost my job which years ago would have shaken me because my identity was so tied to being a good provider and in my job. Instead, I was at total peace and confident that God was in control and would provide (Proverbs 3:5-6). I looked back at the track record of my life and how He patiently directed and guided me, even when I was not faithful. I now knew his promises in the Bible and His character. It created great discussions with family and friends about why I was at peace. We talked about how I knew God would provide in some way and that even if we lost the house or had to move it wouldn't matter because we had God. It was great to discuss that I don't follow God because I think He is going to give me an easy life, riches, or health. I follow God because of who He is, what He has done, and what He continues to do. Six months later, God placed me in a great job with a better work culture. However, the greatest gift was that my family, friends, and old co-workers shared how they were encouraged in how I totally leaned on God during that time and wasn't worried. They shared how they could see that my identity was rooted in God and that I was fully trusting in Him. I'm so grateful to God's patience and grace in restoring my relationship with Him and embracing my identity as a child of God, and that He would use me in some small way to point others to Him.
